In the rural areas of Sub-Saharan-Africa, very few areas have been electrified and most children are left behind from students of developed areas or countries, Some use kerosene lamps but the oil price has been rising sharply, and the smoke exhaustion quite often hurts the eyes and pulmones, and even worse, causes fire disaster.

Through the generosity of our sponsors, Hydronet Energy have been donating solar lights to rural African children, so that they can safely and sustainably study, and go to bed in peace.

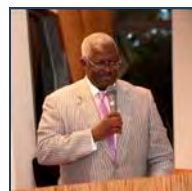

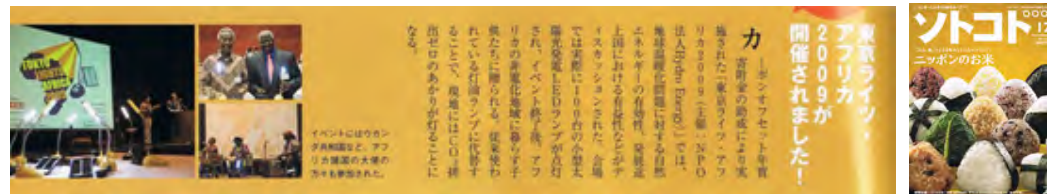
